Summer in the Fruit Garden is beautiful. We have had a good fruit set this spring. Now we are beginning to thin the fruit on the trees as we begin to watch for the June "drop". **The garden needs you**, our volunteers, to help thin the fruit for optimal quality that we all enjoy in the fall. The Imperial Epineuse Plum tree is so loaded with fruit that we have had to thin the fruit a great deal this week, so unusual for a plum tree. Some varieties, such as the Rescue pear, set so perfectly as to rarely need thinning as evidenced by the trees we have in the garden.

Come join us on Thursday mornings. I have always loved the opportunity to spend time in the garden with so many knowledgeable great folks such as Bill and De. Hazel provides coffee and sweet treats. I bring something hot from the oven as well, when I have a chance to come.

We have seen changes in the garden with the addition of new fruit varieties and the loss of several trees to disease and voles. This is also an opportunity to learn how to manage the garden by choosing the right varieties, monitoring the plants, trees and ground closely, carefully applying chemicals as appropriate, and taking other actions to maintain the health of the garden. Volunteering also provides hands-on opportunities to learn about disease and pest management that a person can apply in their own fruit garden. Look for the article in this newsletter from Tom and De about controlling voles in the Fruit Garden.

We are delighted to be able to have a **Cherry Fruit Day** again, on July 14th, 11 am to 2 pm. WSU Northwest Research and Extension Center is not conducting research in the Cherry block this year, to allow us this opportunity. The day will include seminars on growing cherry trees in the home garden as well as an opportunity to pick a bag of cherries. To help fund the ongoing maintenance of the cherry tree block, the cost will be \$5 per bag of fruit picked with WWFRF supplying the bag. It is a small price to pay for the wonderful fruit and provide the support WSU needs to keep the cherry block.

Look for information on the **Summer Fruit Festival and Espalier Symposium** planned for Saturday August 18th at on page of this newsletter. If you have ever wanted to learn more about espalier and its many advantages, come and invite your friends and family. Of course the day would not be complete without a demonstration from Chef Graham Kerr and many other activities. We want to make this the best SFF ever!

WWFRF Fruit Garden...Update

Wetter weather, along with new diseases and pests, has kept us on asteep learning curve. We have made progress in controlling Anthracnose and Bacterial Canker using the torching method...quick, no spray.

With "aggressive" pruning, we have downsized most of our fruit trees, providing better air circulation (scab control) and easier fruit thinning.

Our 20 columnar apple trees are looking good. New plantings of Blue Honeysuckle and Honeyberry bushes will provide an earlier fruit crop that may not be pestered by the SWD (spotted wing drosophila) fruit fly. Blueberries, apples and pears are producing well despite an increase in the vole population. Many new plum cultivars have been added. We'll let you know which ones prove best.

Our goals:

- grow the smallest fruit trees possible using dwarf rootstocks along with espalier and Slender Spindle training systems.
- replace disease-susceptible trees with proven disease-resistant cultivars.
- experiment with non-toxic methods of disease and pest control.
- supplement our tree fruit with an abundant variety of small fruit.

Treasurer's Report – Walt - Income is down 5K from last year. Thank you to Georgene Lee, Rachel Petrich, Mike Ewanciw, Walter Kropp and Shirley Kropp who are on the finance committee. Walt reviewed the financial report. Kristan motioned that we accept the Treasurer's Report, seconded by Bob. Passed unanimously.

Sue, Bill, Gail and Bob are to help organize the information.

Cherry Block – Carol Miles stated that the cherry block will not be used for research this year. We may use it for our cherry day with an educational emphasis but we need to help with the costs of maintaining it. Kristan motioned that we support the cherry block with \$500, seconded by Bob. Passed unanimously. It will be decided if we will charge extra for cherries or ask for donations to raise the \$500.

- Special Volunteer Harvests occur on an as-needed basis to assist the WSU NWREC staff in harvesting specific fruit for data
 collection. This harvest is open to paid members only, and paid members are allowed to keep a portion of the harvest.
